



<u>Transplant Nephrology Pathway</u> OHSU Nephrology Fellowship

Our intensive pathways during fellowship training allow our fellows to gain more experience in areas of particular interest to them, such that they are more prepared to meet their individual career goals.

Training which occurs as part of these pathways is in addition to usual training within our fellowship program.

Clinical expectations for the fellow in the Transplant pathway:

- Seeing patients within a "second clinic" in transplant clinic during their second year. This clinic will be weekly when not working on an inpatient service (~8 months of the second year) and may alternate between OHSU and the VA.
- Spending one month on the OHSU inpatient transplant service during the second year (this is in addition to the usual two months during first year) and one month on the transplant service at Legacy Hospital in Portland, OR.
- Observing a donor and recipient transplant surgery.

Scholarly and educational expectations for the fellow in the Transplant pathway:

- Submitting an abstract to the American Society of Nephrology in the spring of their first year, with plans for poster presentation at ASN in the fall of their second year.
- Completing a research or QI project in the area of transplant nephrology. Fellows will identify a mentor from among our transplant faculty to aid/guide this project.
- Using their Bennett Endowment Fund support to attend the American Society of Transplantation meeting during the second year.
- Attending transplant pathology rounds each week.
- Completing a 2-week rotation during the second year in the OHSU Laboratory of Immunogenetics and Transplantation to expand their knowledge in transplant immunology.
