Other tips that participants shared during the webinar: Supply ideas for emergency kits:

- Baby diapers for feet coverings
- Water
- Having a wind-up radio
- When we got food boxes, I kept the pop-off can soups and protein bars for emergency kits
- Ask for emergency kit items for gifts
- For the Deaf or hard of hearing community, printing off an ASL finger spell chart, maybe laminating it with a marker would be a good item for the kit as well.
- Many are not aware that hearing aids cost \$2-5K per ear. Not always practical to have extra hearing aid unless you have an old one in working condition. However, extra hearing aid or cochlear implant batteries would be helpful for some people.
- Depending on the medication you can ask your doctor to prescribe 2 to 3-month supply
- Ask your insurance or pharmacy about getting a 2-3 day supply of medications.

Emergency plan

- Have a copy of your POA, DNR and end of life planning in your emergency kit
- Email your emergency plan to a family member or case worker
- Discussing your needs in an emergency with landlord or manager

Other things to consider

- If you live in a 2-story building you may need a portable ladder
- Hand crank / bicycle powered generators.
