# A Vision for The State & Beyond!

Since 2010, the OHSU Casey Eye Institute's Community
Outreach Program has been making a meaningful impact by
providing essential eye care to individuals with limited or no
access through its community-based service model thanks to
the ongoing support of compassionate donors and dedicated
volunteers. Since then, Casey's Community Outreach Program
has provided free vision screenings to over 13,000 individuals
in local communities from Oregon's rural landscapes and
rugged coastline to its urban centers.

In 2022, the program officially launched the Oregon Vision Health Network (OVHN), integrating mobile outreach, telehealth screening, and training local health advocates as Vision Health Navigators. This innovative model combines technology and community-based partnerships to expand access to eye care, improve health outcomes, promote health literacy, and connect underserved communities to critical vison services at the local level.

Additionally in 2024, the Theodore R. Lilley Endowment for Community Outreach and Service was established to support the outreach program, ensuring long-term stability and enabling sustained growth and a greater focus on innovation.

Globally, Casey continues to forge strong partnerships in American Samoa and Thailand, focusing on education, research, and eye care. In addition to these collaborations, Casey co-hosted the Annual Global Ophthalmology Summit last year, significantly advancing local eye health worldwide and empowering providers to deliver high-quality care tailored to the needs of their unique communities.

Through sustained community-driven partnerships, these programs are creating extensive access points for vision care directly where people live, work, and play, drastically improving access to vital vision saving care across Oregon and around the world!

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
# **Broadening the Lens of Vision Care**




In 2024 alone, Casey's Community Outreach Program further expanded its reach by:

- Deploying a new mobile eye unit
- Launching 3 additional communitybased telehealth sites, for a total of 5 sites
- Holding 36 mobile outreach clinics
- Completing 7 Vision Health Navigator Trainings.

These incredible efforts have highlighted how the OVHN is working to expand access to vision care across all of Oregon's 36 counties. Go, Casey, Go!!

### **Telehealth Outreach**



Since launching the telehealth vision screening sites, as part of the Oregon Vision Health Network, the Casey Community Outreach Program has established a robust and adaptable telehealth infrastructure, enabling health organizations to effectively monitor and improve vision health outcomes within their own communities.

Now with 5 telehealth sites, with a 6th & 7th site to be launched in 2025, the outreach program continues to enhance and expand access to vision care, further increasing the program's reach across the state.

Each of these community-based sites is equipped with Optical Coherence Tomography (**OCT**), a non-invasive, high-resolution imaging device that provides cross-sectional views of the eye. This technology allows individuals to be screened and referred locally, greatly expanding and improving access to early detection and monitoring of eye diseases throughout Oregon!

### **Telehealth Outreach**

In 2024 alone, the outreach program's telehealth sites provided critical vision care access to **271 individuals identified at being at risk for vision loss.** 

In the program's telehealth model, local primary care clinical teams identify individuals from their community that have known risk factors for eye disease and schedule them to receive a vision screening utilizing an OCT.

Enhanced by the OCT screening interpretation, the community-based primary care team provides individuals with recommended follow-up care or helps them obtain prescription glasses from a local eye provider. If local care is unavailable, the program deploys its mobile eye clinic as a safety net to ensure access to necessary services.

## **Mobile Outreach**



In 2024, Casey's Community Outreach Program unveiled its state-of-the-art mobile eye clinic, designed to revolutionize patient care. Completely funded by generous donors, Casey's latest mobile unit is equipped with two private exam lanes, space for advanced imaging equipment, and features a fully accessible and innovative design. This leading-edge clinic greatly expands the program's reach while maximizing the range of services that can be provided.

With this new mobile eye clinic, Casey's Outreach Program conducted **36 community-based vision screening clinics,** providing essential vision care to **1,014 adults**. These services delivered an impressive **in-kind gift of \$707,175**, of vision care benefiting communities across Oregon by ensuring greater access to high-quality eye care for all those served.

## **Mobile Outreach**

Casey's Community Outreach Program is a proud founding member of the OHSU Mobile Health Coalition (MHC), which supports the collaboration and advancement of mobile health programs throughout the OHSU health system and the broader mobile health community.

This last year the MHC was awarded Best Poster at the Mobile Healthcare Association's annual conference, recognize the impact of this innovate multidisciplinary mobile coalition.

By sharing expertise, the MHC aims to overcome the limitations of traditional health care delivery systems and maximize the impact of each program's services, demonstrating OHSU's commitment to providing effective and equitable care to all, mile-after-mile.



This year, the outreach program introduced a new care plan category to better highlight its impact and help individuals understand their risk factors for vision loss. Along with the referral and urgent categories, the newly implemented recommended category emphasizes the importance of early detection and preventive care in ending blindness. Of the 1,014 served, 826 (82%) either required a care plan or prescription glasses. Specifically, 619 (61%) needed prescription glasses, while 509 (50%) required a care plan categorized below as referral, recommended, or urgent due to a condition that would threaten their vision health.



Of the 1,014 vision screenings exams provided to adults across Oregon 826 (82%) required either prescription glasses or a vision care plan



196 (19%) of those served received a referral for follow-up care, with 10 (5%) of those referrals noted as **urgent** requiring immediate follow-up



313 (31%) of those served received a recommendation for an annual exam to monitor an underlying risk factor, but no intervention at this time



619 (61%) of those served received a prescription and glasses at no-cost

# Vision Health Navigator Training

As a key element of the Oregon Vision Health Network (OVHN), the outreach program's Vision Health Navigator training has equipped **323** local health advocates and certified community health workers with the skills to identify vision loss risks, conduct screenings, and connect individuals to eye care resources.

In 2024, over **86** individuals were trained as Vision Health Navigators, representing 30 unique clinical and social service agencies from across Oregon.

Approved by the Oregon Health Authority Office of Equity and Inclusion, this training builds on the program's experience connecting Oregonians to essential eye care. It has also been adapted to support Casey's work in Thailand, expanding the program's global impact and strengthening vision health worldwide.

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### **Global Outreach**

In 2024, Mitchell Brinks, M.D., M.P.H., Medical Director of the outreach program, was honored as the inaugural recipient of the Sterling H. and Anna Marie Tebbetts Endowed Professorship.

Established in honor of visionaries Sterling and Annie Tebbetts, the Tebbetts Professorship is poised to drive innovation in eye care, expanding the outreach program's impact and bringing the gift of sight to more individuals in need, both locally and globally.

Thanks to the generosity of The Ford Family Foundation in Roseburg, and steadfast support of Dr. Joe Robertson and Patricia Fisher Robertson it is an honor to have the Tebbetts Professorship sustain this important work.

In addition to this milestone, Global Outreach continued its efforts to improve eye care access in underserved communities around the world. Over the past year, programs in Thailand and American Samoa provided eye screenings, surgeries, and educational initiatives in collaboration with local eye care physicians and professionals.

Similar to rural Oregon, vision care is scarce in these regions. With the support of local partners and donors, Casey's ophthalmology faculty are helping build infrastructure for early detection and prevention of eye diseases.

These partnerships have allowed Casey to collaborate with international communities to overcome significant barriers to accessing eye care, providing training and technology to implement lasting solutions that enhance eye care systems and preserve sight worldwide.





Also in 2024, the 3rd Annual Global Ophthalmology Summit was held in Portland, with over 360 attendees at one of the largest global ophthalmology gatherings to date. Since its inception, at OHSU Casey Eye Institute in 2009, the conference has grown significantly to become a prominent annual event to advance eye health and reduce vision loss worldwide through education, research, collaboration, and public health advocacy.

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CASEY'S COMMUNITY AND GLOBAL OUTREACH PROGRAMS HAVE BEEN INSTRUMENTAL IN EXTENDING VITAL VISION AND EYE CARE SERVICES TO COUNTLESS UNDERSERVED PEOPLE ACROSS THE WORLD.
