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

Indian Affairs & Indian Health 101


Fundamental Guiding Legal Principles

- •Tribal Nations are sovereign and hold a political status, it's not race-based.
- •The federal government has a government-to-government relationship with Tribal Nations established by the U.S. Constitution, treaties, Executive Orders, statutes, case law, etc.
- •Collectively, these are the foundations of the legal, moral, and ethical responsibility of the United States to Tribal Nations which we know as the trust responsibility.
- •From Administration to Administration, Congress has appropriated funding to Tribal Nations in honor of trust and treaty obligations, and the political status of Tribal Nations.
- •Healthcare is of one of the many contractual obligations owed to Tribal Nations.

DEI Executive Orders Do Not Apply Al/AN citizens have political status

- On February 25, 2025, HHS Office of General Counsel (OGC) released an Advisory Opinion (25-01) stating that three recent Executive Orders (EOs) do not abridge the Department's legal obligation to provide healthcare for Indian Tribes and their citizens, the government-to-government relationship, and underlying Trust and Treaty obligations, which are **distinct from** the programs described in the recent EOs (EO 14151; EO 14168; EO 14173).
- The Advisory Opinion aligns with the Department of Interior's Secretarial Order 3416
 acknowledging that EO 14151 does not affect the trust and treaty obligations to
 Tribal Nations.
- This also aligns with a recent HHS memorandum which became public that EOs
 affecting DEIA programs do not apply to programs serving AI/AN citizens, as
 AI/AN citizens have a political status.


