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Topic: Reality-Based Care and Addressing Access Barriers

- What barriers do your patients face when accessing health care?
- How do social and emotional factors influence access to and adherence to care?
- Was a barrier to care addressed or removed by the street nurses? Have you seen these barriers acknowledged and addressed from the acute care setting?
- Provide an example of how you would incorporate this approach into bedside care.

Topic: Tri-Morbidity

- What did the nurse prioritize from the physical, mental health, substance use, and trauma perspectives?
- What were the patient's priorities and how did the nurse respond?
- How do multiple comorbidities and social factors influence labels from health care providers of noncompliance?

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Topic: Medical Topics

- What diagnosis and medical treatment issues did we see in the field today that are unique to street nursing or healthcare for the homeless?
- How did the academic clinical partnership influence the patient's medical care? What about additional community partnerships that address social factors of health?
- Provide an SBAR summary of your encounter with a patient referred to the clinic or hospital.

Topic: Harm Reduction, Moving Beyond Stigma to Care

- Describe a harm reduction technique or strategy that you observed.
- What was the outcome and how does it benefit the patient?
- A common misconception of harm reduction is that it enables the patient to continue to use drugs. After seeing HR approaches in action, reflect on this belief. Was the patient empowered to care more for their health?
- How could you practice harm reduction in the acute care setting?

Topic: Trauma and Violence Informed Care

- Describe any TVIC strategies that you observed.
- How do trauma-informed care and a strengths-based approach relate?
- Did you utilize or observe continuous positive regard?
- What topics may risk re-traumatization of patients?

Topic: Motivational Interviewing

- What conversations involved assessing readiness to change? Where do you think your patient landed on the Readiness to Change ruler?
- Why is acknowledgment of the patient's goal essential?
- If your patient is motivated to change, how can the nurse support the next steps?

Topic: Self-Care for Nurses

- What strategies do you use to get centered and exhibit presence with others on the street?
- What was difficult or traumatic?
- Do approaches with humility change the tone of patient/nurse interactions? How could this relate to resilience for your practice?
